Sarcochilus Growing Hints

Neville Roper 2006

The term 'Sarco' is commonly used to refer to a group of genera including Sarcochilus, *Plectorrhiza, Rhinerrhiza, Parasarcochilus, Schistostylis, Peristanthus* etc. (all cool growers) and even *Phalaenopsis* (namely *amabilis*, the only native and definitely a warm grower). It is also used to refer to an ever increasing number of hybrids both within and between these groups. The use of this term is often incorrect.

Growing Conditions

They are grown in a shadehouse. I use one layer of 70% shadecloth in winter (maybe Easter to the October long weekend) for the rest of the year two layers of 70% are used. Under my benches is a layer of pinebark while the walkways are made of river pebbles and on hot days these are hosed down to moderate temperature and increase humidity. Some protection from westerly winds may prove beneficial.

Mixes

I have been using the same for Sarco's and Den's -

- 80% treated pine bark, medium to coarse grade (or a mix of the two.)
- 20% river pebbles of a similar size to the bark.

Over the last twelve months I have been using cocomulch as a substitute for pine bark as the quality of the bark has decreased and price has escalated. A recent trip to Melbourne revealed that many growers were already converted to a variety of cocopeat products many of which were readily available at show sales stalls. An internet search of 'orchids + cocopeat' revealed that cocopeat is widely used by U.S. orchid nurseries and so I began experimenting. For sarc.s I use cocomulch - a chunky mix of coconut husk pieces which I soak, flush and sieve out the fines. I have combined this in various ratios the following

Although I have made some mistakes which mostly relate to overwatering all experimental mixes seem to be growing well over the short term but the long term success will be the true test. (use this with caution many growers used this for a few years but only those with a solid roof had long term moderate success. editor.)

Pots and Mounts

- Pots: Plastic squat pots, well drained, are my preference. Watch out for fat juicy roots or pebbles blocking your drainage! Terracotta pots are also very good.
- Mounts: Some species prefer to be mounted (usually Sarcochilus falcatus, weinthalii, Plectorrhiza tridentata, Rhinerrhiza divitiflora) and there are endless possibilities that will suit them. Try some of the following - red cedar, melaleuca branches, treefern slabs, cork, aged fence palings, bagasse or gutterguard pouches filled with bark. You should not overlook tying some to live trees in your garden.

Fertilising

As for all other natives - little and often - but as *Sarco's* grow year round and especially in autumn. Winter fertilising should be maintained. I often forget to fertilise in winter so now I apply a top-dressing of a slow release fertiliser as they are repotted in autumn. I also lime all of my plants in spring and autumn with superfine lime at one gram per litre (agitate to keep it in suspension).

Most fertilisers are suitable and the following have been used with little problem -Aquasol[®], Nitrosol[®], fish emulsion, Campbells, Phostrogen[®], Peters[®], HSO 8, Nutricote[®] and similar products. A little extra Epsom Salts and iron chelates occasionally does no harm. It is always a good idea to alternate between brands and always water at least once between applications of fertiliser. I have recently come to the conclusion that it is imperative to use some organic fertiliser. I have begun to top dress all repotted plants with blood and bone plus dolomite lime (50:50 in a big salt shaker) and a good drink of Seasol[®].

If you have time to frequently mist the leaves with a weak fertiliser solution then you will be rewarded with fantastic fat, glossy leaves.

Repotting

This can be done anytime but avoid the hottest and coldest periods, autumn seems to be the best. They like fresh mix and should be repotted at least every two years. A drench with Seasol[®] immediately after potting seems to eliminate transplant shock.

Watering

Sarco's have no psuedobulbs and so cannot withstand long periods without water. They are surprisingly resilient due to their thick leaves and fleshy roots which enable them to survive short dry spells and watering routines should reflect this. Lack of water is less critical if high levels of humidity are maintained.

S. ceciliae has its own requirements preferring to be grown a little on the dry side. I used to grow them in terra cotta pots under cover and give them a good drenching then allow them to dry out.


If you decide to try cocomulch then be careful with your watering and do not push the potting mix into the pots too firmly - its very different to the open pinebark mixes most of us have been using. (*you have been warned, ed*).

Pests

Sarco's have no particular problems in this area except for *S. ceciliae* which occasionally becomes infested with scale. I prefer to scratch them off and keep the ants at bay as much as possible. White oil the recommended treatment should be used with caution or you can do what I did - stop growing them!

In My Bushhouse

Well September is here and for most native growers this is the time when all the hard work has paid off. The rain that pelted down for a few short days was incredible. My 'rain gauge' my wheel barrow was emptied half full then refilled again so I estimate that we received at least 6" under the old scale or 150mm. The storm we had last night was very intense but needed after we had a massive 35 deg. along with wind dried out the plants so I had to water in the morning then next day the rain.

When I walk out on to my deck this week as the sun comes up the smell is intense with honey and the fragrance of *Dendrobium speciosum*. However in the bushhouse all the species are coming out and two that have the most powerful fragrance are poles apart. One, *Dendrobium falcorostrum* is a favorite of mine that finally is growing well for me. I have heard that it is hard to grow near the sea but have not found this the case especially if under 2 layers of 50% shadecloth and misted on hot days in summer. Two, is *Plectorrhiza tridentata* whose small flowers push out a fragrance that is punching above its size as you can sense this easily from 6 m. away.

Not everyone likes the fragrance of Australian natives as I have noticed at out spring shows over the years. Some, few in numbers, walk into our hall and turn around and walk back out. To them it's like a mouthful of chili, to me It's like a fine red wine just can't get enough.

Flowering now are *Dendrobium speciosum*, *Dendrobium tetragonum*, *melaleucaphilum*, and *capitisyork*. *Dendrobium adae*, and all varieties of *Dendrobium speciosum*. *Plectorrhiza tridentata*, and some *Sarcochilus falcatus*. *Dendrobium jonesii*, *Dockrillia striolata*, *Dockrillia chrysantha*, *Dockrillia pugioniformis*, and more of the *Dockrillia calamiformis*, *fairfaxii*, *dolichophylla*, *and Dockrillia racemosa*.

Look out for aphids and other bugs as the weather warms up the will be about. The next huge job even before the Sarcochilus are opening will be repotting and some *Den. speciosum* need to be done now. I have started to cut off all the old spikes on *Dendrobium speciosum* as some are finished and I need to get a move on this year with potting and dividing. I will pot on or divide, to get the maximum growing time. As I go I will make-up my mix and then give each plant some 9 month slow release and Confidor[®] balls in each. When cutting of spikes and dividing I sterilize all my instruments in a saturated solution of Trycleanium[®], which is highly alkaline to kill any organism or bacteria that may exist.

Water restrictions are still in effect with the dams at 100% if anybody can explain that to me that makes sense I will give them a beer. Anyway it shouldn't concern us too much as we have to water early in the morning or late evening and my tank is full at the moment. If you don't have a tank then this is something that you should have even a small one will help out greatly.

I will increase the misting system that I installed last summer that did reduce the amount of water used but also reduced the temperature of the plants and added humidity and contributed to better growing conditions during the summer months.

The repotting of my Sarcochilus earlier in the year, and added blood and bone for each, has paid dividends and they are looking good. Many with multiple spikes and glistening leaves, looking forward to the flowering next month.

Trek out Western NSW by lan Chalmers

Escape Covid-19 Madness to Orchids on the Western Plains NSW.

Irene and I planned a trip to Queensland to visit Amanda and our granddaughters. A number of selfish people caused a second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic and the border was closed to all NSW. We made a mistake by not using the 48 hour window to cross the border.

We the planned to go to country NSW for 2 weeks to acclimatise before crossing into Queensland, this was foiled by the complete closure of the border.

We decided to go to country NSW anyway.

We headed for Parkes first to look at the radio telescope, or Dish as it's called. This is an impressive structure dominating the plain.

From the Dish we travelled north to Peak Hill to see the fossils and gold mine. We returned to Parkes via Goobang National Park, in the park we found a number of orchids in bud but only *Caladenia caerulea* in flower.

The following Day we headed north to Coonabarabran stopping at the Dubbo, Western Plains Zoo.

North of Dubbo we dropped into the Goonoo National Park here we photographed *Caladenia caerulea* and *Pterostyllis curta*, growing in sandy soil covered with she oak needles.

We established our base for the next week in Coonabarabran in the Wagon Wheel Cabins. From this base we visited the Wurrumbungle National Park, the Pilliga Reserves, and the Colah Tops National Park. As well as Siding Spring Observatory and the private Milroy Observatory.

We found many orchids in these sites.

Caladenia caerulea, seems to have a very extensive range as we found it wherever we stopped from Parkes to Pilliga. Its colours range from pale mauve through to a deep blue purple. We found it in quite variable conditions along the walks within the Wurrumbungles and most trails in the Pilliga.

We found a mutation on the Sculptures in the Bush walk in the Pilliga, there were 4 plants which may be a natural hybrid with *Glossodia major* or a mutation. The flowers had a straight labellum and fleshier segments.

Caladenia caerulea Goonoo NP

Typical habitat bright light in sandy soil lightly covered with leaf litter.



Caladenia fuscata, was found growing with C. caerulea, in the Pilliga it differs from C. caerulea in that the leaves are thinner and erect vs C. caerulea being broader and prostrate. Also the lip on C. fuscata has a chin while C. caerulea curls under. C. fuscata was flowering by the road to the pottery, the Sandstone Cave track and the Sculptures in the Bush track.





Pterostylis curta was found by the trails in the Warrumbungles along the Burble Canyon track and the Spirey View track, *Caladenia caerulea* was growing at the start of the Burble Canyon Track.

Pterostylis cynocephala was growing in the Pilliga near the road to the pottery, the Sandstone Caves, and Sculptures in the Bush.

The lower tracks around the Information Centre seemed to be too degraded so we did not follow them. There was a sign where *Cymbidium canaliculatum* once grew.

We found *Cymbidium canaliculatum* on Angophora trees on the Cumbil Road in Pilliga and in the northern part of the Pilliga.

From the Pilliga we moved north to Mt Kaputar National Park, here we found several plants of *Cymbidium canaliculatum* on Angophora trees in the edges of the Mt Kaputar National Park and on remnant trees on farmland. Once in the park and on the mountain, we found no orchids.

We found various other orchids in leaf such as possibly *Caladenia tentaculata*, *Acianthus reniformis* and many *Pterostylis* rosettes. The telescope at Siding Spring was awe inspiring, the history of the telescope was very interesting. From the base of the observatory is the best view of the Warrumbungle Range. We visited a private observatory and looked through their telescope at the night sky, wow. Even with the naked eye the sky out west is more spectacular than in the city with all the light pollution.

What struck us throughout the trip is the mass destruction of the forest by high intensity fire, It will take 20 years to recover if at all. Some areas, all the trees were dead, in other places there was only secondary growth on the trees so they can reproduce, and new trees grow to replace them. In most areas the understory had vanished, and ferns and weeds have taken over. These areas cannot take any more burning and burning now would lead to loss of species diversity. One major problem is the loss of the birds, animals and other pollinators that are required for the forests to recover.




