General Business:

Cary Polis introduced St. Ives Orchid Fair Treasurer, Kevin Crocker who spoke of the recent St. Ives Orchid Fair, which was a great success. He thanked members for their support and hard work and stressed the need for such continuing support to ensure future successful Fairs. Attendance figures were detailed with these being the best yet. Friday and Saturday were exceedingly well attended with lower numbers attending on the Sunday. All vendors reported record sales and the society sales desk sold over 600 plants. EFT greatly facilitated payments.

A cheque for \$5500 was presented to ANOS Warringah, along with another of \$500 for our display.

Mick's Rambles:

Mick lamented the adverse effect that the recent heat had on orchid flowering. He brought in a variety of plants to intrigue members:

Den. gracilicaule v. *howianum* – this variety tends to have slightly larger flowers than its mainland counterpart with pink markings present on the labellum. It also displays more robust pseudobulbs and flowers well from back canes.

Den. gracilicaule x *kingianum* – occurs as a natural hybrid, as well as in manipulated forms. 'Doyle's River Gold' is one such example.

Delicatum-type orchids were discussed *Den*. x Kestevenii is one famous example, with flower colour different to other types, such as "Coloradi"?

Mick then spoke of a favourite book "The Orchids of NSW" by Reverend Rupp which was first published in the 1940s. This mentioned Kestevenii as being a species, although it is now known to be a hybrid.

Bill Dobson then displayed a battery-powered hand sprayer made by Gardena, which makes light spraying/misting more convenient as it is not adversely affected by orientation. He also related an interesting bush walk he had recently where he noted magnificent displays of Waratahs and the presence of *Calochilus paludosus*. Cary Polis was then coerced into giving members a dissertation of his remarkable *Den. smilliae* and its growing conditions.

In My Bushhouse

As I write this, we are into October the shows, apart from the *Sarcochilus*, are done and dusted and I have a full blown repot on my hands as I haven't touched a lot of my *Dendrobium speciosum* and *Den kingianum* for over 3 years.

So, this year as I'm older and slower I am attacking them systematically with nearly all of the *Den speciosum* removed from the greenhouse and dividing and repotting where necessary. Plenty of Tricleanium[®] in my bucket to sterilize the scissors and new pots and hangers. Funny I will reuse the hangers but always new pots. If anyone wants used port pots I have plenty they just need to be washed and sterilized.

With the warmer weather I get up earlier, I'm either woken by my wife or the cat, both want something to eat and drink, and clean up after them[©]. No rest for the wicked.

Anyway, time to get into the plants as each of them gets broken up or potted on I apply a 9-month slow-release fertilizer to each. I've graduated from stakes for the newly divided plant to hangers which in my mind support the plant better until the new roots appear.

At the start of each month until February I'll give all the plants a spray of Auxinone[®] and Seasol[®] to settle them in and get new roots coming.

I just took a walk through the bushhouse to give the plants another mist as it's been 38.5 deg today and although the temperature has dropped it's still 35. As I walk I had a waft of delightful perfume first from *Dockrillia schoenina* and then as I passed *Dockrillia pugionformis*.

Also flowering at the moment, I have *Dockrillia calamiformis, Dockrillia striolata, Dockrillia mortii* as well as *Sarcochilus aequalis, Sarcochilus hartmannii, Dendrobium fleckeri all starting to open, with Sarcochilus fitzgeraldii not* far behind. *Bulbophyllum wadsworthii* is putting out some flowers as well as a couple of *Dockrillia linguiformis* and some late flowering *Dendrobium kingianum*.

So this is it for me for the next couple of months at least potting, watering and fertilizing. Starting in October once a month spray the plants with Mancozeb[®] If it becomes too humid I'll also use Bravo, or similar, to combat any other fungal infections. When the new growths come be on the lookout for aphids as they can devastate a new growth. I use Pirimor[®] but if you don't have this use a similar bug spray.

Well that's it for me for the moment. Keep cool.





In the Bush with Chris Murray

Over the past few months I have spent quite a lot of Saturday mornings going down various gullies and creeks, looking for the southernmost *Dendrobium gracilicaule* that I can find. This has been quite a slog and is mostly responsible for why I completely missed the *Dendrobium speciosum* flowering season. Not that I didn't see any speciosum, but all the ones you find in shady gullies never seem to flower. I needed to see the ones on the more exposed rocky outcrops. However, I did get to go on some great walks and tick off some spots that I have been eyeing up for a while. In the end, I was successful in finding a new location for *D. gracilicaule*, but not as far south as I was hoping for.

I was lucky enough to also go on a quick trip to Barrington Tops to check out the *Dendrobium falcorostrum*. None in flower sadly. It has been a tough dry winter in the mountains it seems. Further south too, the winter has been hard. I did briefly go to check out the last/only *Dendrobium speciosum* growing in Lane Cove National Park and they were in a pretty bad condition. I do not expect them to survive the summer.

I also visited some *Doc. banksii* in the Watagans and they were struggling too, I was about a week too early to see them flower annoyingly. The Ku-ring-gai <u>*D. striolatum*</u> seemed OK though. Hopefully, the summer humidity will give our local epiphytes a boost.

Next year, I think I will spend some time visiting the local speciosum's...and teretifolium's. There are some great spots- if you know where to look :)
