In my Bushhouse

Water First then Fertilise?

OK.... over the break I had a talk with a friend from Melbourne and the question came up about when to fertilise and he had always watered first then applied fertiliser.

I said that the roots of an orchid are covered with velamen which consists of non-living compact cells with lignified strips of secondary walls. These cells provide support, prevent water loss and assist the plant in absorbing water. When dry the orchid root appears white, and when wet the root appears green because the cells of the velamen absorb water, become translucent and reveal the green cortical cells.

So I asked him if he had ever tried to soak up a spill of water with a wet sponge!

That's the analogy I use and have been since growing orchids. If you want the plant to absorb the fertiliser in the amount you should be giving it, then why soak it in water first so it can't take it up? Makes no sense to me.... What do you do?

First the heat then the rain, although I'm not complaining, as last night we received 80mm of rain so the plants received a thorough drenching. New roots and growths are appearing, so look after them. Keep aphids away and don't forget to watch for any rots as the warm and humid weather continues this month. With Dendrobiums I peel back the outer sheath when I can feel the flower eyes as this will prevent any fungal spores settling in here and rotting off. I will spray with Eco seaweed this month and next and also Eco fungicide.

This weekend I'm due to spray all the new growths for Dendrobium beetle. You must keep this up for the next 2-3 months or until the growths have matured and hardened off.

I continue to repot as the plants demand it and the odd plant which may need dividing. But if you haven't done it within the next 2-3 weeks I would leave it until April and the cooler weather.

Keep the weeds at bay and remove all old leaves and old flower spikes as well, if you haven't done so already. If you haven't reported plants, now is the time to top dress with some blood and bone and some slow release like Osmocote Pro Low Phosphorous 8-9 month 16 + 3.9 + 9.1 + 1.8 Mg + TE slow release. If you can't get this, use one for natives with the lowest in Nitrogen.
